



# **Bible readings for Sight Loss Sunday 2025**

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# **General Notes**

- 1 Samuel 3:1–10
- 1 Corinthians 12:4–26

They can be used alone or in combination with other readings. The readings had been offered in the following translations:

- New Revised Standard Version (Anglicised) (NRSVA), for use in churches which follow the RCL or its equivalents (e.g. Common Worship)
- Authorised/King James Version (AV/KJV)
- New International Version – UK (NIVUK)
- Good News Bible/Today's English Version (GNB/GNT)
- The Message (MSG)

These translations have been chosen because they are widely used in a number of churches, enabling blind or partially sighted congregation members to do the reading for Sight Loss Sunday.

## **New Revised Standard Version (Anglicised) (NRSVA)**

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# **1 Samuel 3:1–10**

## **Samuel's Calling and Prophetic Activity**

**<sup>1</sup>Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the Lord under Eli. The word of the Lord was rare in those days; visions were not widespread.**

**<sup>2</sup>At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room; <sup>3</sup>the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the Lord, where the ark of God was.**

**<sup>4</sup>Then the Lord called, 'Samuel! Samuel!' [ <sup>a</sup> ] and he said, 'Here I am!' <sup>5</sup>and ran to Eli, and said, 'Here I am, for you called me.' But he said, 'I did not call; lie down again.' So he went and lay down. <sup>6</sup>The Lord called again, 'Samuel!' Samuel got up and went to Eli, and said, 'Here I am, for you called me.' But he said, 'I did not call, my son; lie down again.' <sup>7</sup>Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord, and the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him.**

**<sup>8</sup>The Lord called Samuel again, a third time. And he got up and went to Eli, and said, 'Here I am, for you called me.' Then Eli perceived that the Lord was calling the boy.**

**<sup>9</sup>Therefore Eli said to Samuel, 'Go, lie down; and if he calls you, you shall say, "Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening."' So Samuel went and lay down in his place.**

**<sup>10</sup>Now the Lord came and stood there, calling as before, 'Samuel! Samuel!' And Samuel said, 'Speak, for your servant is listening.'**

# **1 Corinthians 12:4–26**

<sup>4</sup>Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; <sup>5</sup>and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; <sup>6</sup>and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. <sup>7</sup>To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. <sup>8</sup>To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, <sup>9</sup>to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, <sup>10</sup>to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. <sup>11</sup>All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

## **One Body with Many Members**

<sup>12</sup>For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. <sup>13</sup>For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body – Jews or Greeks, slaves or free – and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

<sup>14</sup>Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. <sup>15</sup>If the foot were to say, ‘Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body’, that would not make it any less a part of the body. <sup>16</sup>And if the ear were to say, ‘Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body’, that would not make it any less a part of the body. <sup>17</sup>If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? <sup>18</sup>But as it is, God arranged the members in the

body, each one of them, as he chose. <sup>19</sup>If all were a single member, where would the body be? <sup>20</sup>As it is, there are many members, yet one body. <sup>21</sup>The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I have no need of you', nor again the head to the feet, 'I have no need of you.' <sup>22</sup>On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, <sup>23</sup>and those members of the body that we think less honourable we clothe with greater honour, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; <sup>24</sup>whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honour to the inferior member, <sup>25</sup>that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. <sup>26</sup>If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honoured, all rejoice together with it.

## **Authorised/King James Version (AV/KJV)**

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### **1 Samuel 3:1–10**

And the child Samuel ministered unto the Lord before Eli.  
And the word of the Lord was precious in those days;

*there was no open vision.* <sup>2</sup>And it came to pass at that time, when Eli was laid down in his place, and his eyes began to wax dim, *that* he could not see; <sup>3</sup>and ere the lamp of God went out in the temple of the Lord, where the ark of God was, and Samuel was laid down *to sleep*; <sup>4</sup>that the Lord called Samuel: and he answered, Here *am* I. <sup>5</sup>And he ran unto Eli, and said, Here *am* I; for thou calledst me. And he said, I called not; lie down again. And he went and lay down. <sup>6</sup>And the Lord called yet again, Samuel. And Samuel arose and went to Eli, and said, Here *am* I; for thou didst call me. And he answered, I called not, my son; lie down again. <sup>7</sup>Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord, neither was the word of the Lord yet revealed unto him. <sup>8</sup>And the Lord called Samuel again the third time. And he arose and went to Eli, and said, Here *am* I; for thou didst call me. And Eli perceived that the Lord had called the child. <sup>9</sup>Therefore Eli said unto Samuel, Go, lie down: and it shall be, if he call thee, that thou shalt say, Speak, Lord; for thy servant heareth. ## **1 Corinthians 12:4–26**

<sup>4</sup>Now there are diversities of gifts, but the same Spirit. <sup>5</sup>And there are differences of administrations, but the same Lord. <sup>6</sup>And there are diversities of operations, but it is the same God which worketh all in all. <sup>7</sup>But the manifestation of the Spirit is given to every man to profit withal. <sup>8</sup>For to one is given by the Spirit the word of wisdom; to another the word of knowledge by the same



Spirit; <sup>9</sup>to another faith by the same Spirit; to another the gifts of healing by the same Spirit; <sup>10</sup>to another the working of miracles; to another prophecy; to another discerning of spirits; to another divers kinds of tongues; to another the interpretation of tongues: <sup>11</sup>but all these worketh that one and the selfsame Spirit, dividing to every man severally as he will.

<sup>12</sup>For as the body is one, and hath many members, and all the members of that one body, being many, are one body: so also *is* Christ. <sup>13</sup>For by one Spirit are we all baptized into one body, whether we *be* Jews or Gentiles, whether we *be* bond or free; and have been all made to drink into one Spirit. <sup>14</sup>For the body is not one member, but many. <sup>15</sup>If the foot shall say, Because I am not the hand, I am not of the body; is it therefore not of the body? <sup>16</sup>And if the ear shall say, Because I am not the eye, I am not of the body; is it therefore not of the body? <sup>17</sup>If the whole body were an eye, where were the hearing? If the whole were hearing, where were the smelling? <sup>18</sup>But now hath God set the members every one of them in the body, as it hath pleased him. <sup>19</sup>And if they were all one member, where were the body? <sup>20</sup>But now *are they* many members, yet but one body. <sup>21</sup>And the eye cannot say unto the hand, I have no need of thee: nor again the head to the feet, I have no need of you. <sup>22</sup>Nay, much more those members of the body, which seem to be more feeble, are necessary: <sup>23</sup>and those *members* of the body, which we think to be less honourable, upon these we bestow more abundant honour; and our uncomely *parts* have more abundant comeliness. <sup>24</sup>For our comely *parts* have no need: but God hath tempered the body together, having given more abundant honour to that *part* which lacked: <sup>25</sup>that there

should be no schism in the body; but *that* the members should have the same care one for another. <sup>26</sup>And whether one member suffer, all the members suffer with it; or one member be honoured, all the members rejoice with it.

## **New International Version – UK (NIVUK)**

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### **1 Samuel 3:1–10**

#### **The Lord calls Samuel**

The boy Samuel ministered before the Lord under Eli. In those days the word of the Lord was rare; there were not many visions.

<sup>2</sup>One night Eli, whose eyes were becoming so weak that he could barely see, was lying down in his usual place.

<sup>3</sup>The lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the house of the Lord, where the ark of God was. <sup>4</sup>Then the Lord called Samuel.

Samuel answered, ‘Here I am.’ <sup>5</sup>And he ran to Eli and said, ‘Here I am; you called me.’

But Eli said, ‘I did not call; go back and lie down.’ So he went and lay down.

**<sup>6</sup>Again the Lord called, ‘Samuel!’ And Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, ‘Here I am; you called me.’**

**‘My son,’ Eli said, ‘I did not call; go back and lie down.’**

**<sup>7</sup>Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord: the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him.**

**<sup>8</sup>A third time the Lord called, ‘Samuel!’ And Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, ‘Here I am; you called me.’**

**Then Eli realised that the Lord was calling the boy. <sup>9</sup>So Eli told Samuel, ‘Go and lie down, and if he calls you, say, “Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening.”’ So Samuel went and lay down in his place.**

## **1 Corinthians 12:4–26**

**<sup>4</sup>There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit distributes them. <sup>5</sup>There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. <sup>6</sup>There are different kinds of working, but in all of them and in everyone it is the same God at work.**

**<sup>7</sup>Now to each one the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good. <sup>8</sup>To one there is given through the Spirit a message of wisdom, to another a message of knowledge by means of the same Spirit, <sup>9</sup>to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by that one Spirit, <sup>10</sup>to another miraculous powers, to another**

prophecy, to another distinguishing between spirits, to another speaking in different kinds of tongues, and to still another the interpretation of tongues. <sup>11</sup>All these are the work of one and the same Spirit, and he distributes them to each one, just as he determines.

### Unity and diversity in the body

<sup>12</sup>Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ. <sup>13</sup>For we were all baptised by one Spirit so as to form one body – whether Jews or Gentiles, slave or free – and we were all given the one Spirit to drink. <sup>14</sup>And so the body is not made up of one part but of many.

<sup>15</sup>Now if the foot should say, ‘Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body,’ it would not for that reason stop being part of the body. <sup>16</sup>And if the ear should say, ‘Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body,’ it would not for that reason stop being part of the body. <sup>17</sup>If the whole body were an eye, where would the sense of hearing be? If the whole body were an ear, where would the sense of smell be? <sup>18</sup>But in fact God has placed the parts in the body, every one of them, just as he wanted them to be. <sup>19</sup>If they were all one part, where would the body be? <sup>20</sup>As it is, there are many parts, but one body.

<sup>21</sup>The eye cannot say to the hand, ‘I don’t need you!’ And the head cannot say to the feet, ‘I don’t need you!’ <sup>22</sup>On the contrary, those parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, <sup>23</sup>and the parts that we think are less honourable we treat with special honour. And the parts that are unpresentable are treated with special modesty, <sup>24</sup>while our presentable parts need no special treatment. But God has put the body together, giving

greater honour to the parts that lacked it, <sup>25</sup>so that there should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each other. <sup>26</sup>If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honoured, every part rejoices with it.

## **Good News Bible/Today's English Version (GNB/GNT)**

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### **1 Samuel 3:1–10**

#### **The Lord Appears to Samuel**

In those days, when the boy Samuel was serving the Lord under the direction of Eli, there were very few messages from the Lord, and visions from him were quite rare. <sup>2</sup>One night Eli, who was now almost blind, was sleeping in his own room; <sup>3</sup>Samuel was sleeping in the sanctuary, where the sacred Covenant Box was. Before dawn, while the lamp was still burning, <sup>4</sup>the Lord called Samuel. He answered, “Yes, sir!” <sup>5</sup>and ran to Eli and said, “You called me, and here I am.”

But Eli answered, “I didn’t call you; go back to bed.” So Samuel went back to bed.

<sup>6–7</sup>The Lord called Samuel again. The boy did not know that it was the Lord, because the Lord had never spoken

to him before. So he got up, went to Eli, and said, “You called me, and here I am.”

But Eli answered, “My son, I didn’t call you; go back to bed.”

<sup>8</sup>The Lord called Samuel a third time; he got up, went to Eli, and said, “You called me, and here I am.”

Then Eli realized that it was the Lord who was calling the boy, <sup>9</sup>so he said to him, “Go back to bed; and if he calls you again, say, ‘Speak, Lord, your servant is listening.’” So Samuel went back to bed.

<sup>10</sup>The Lord came and stood there, and called as he had before, “Samuel! Samuel!”

Samuel answered, “Speak; your servant is listening.”

## **1 Corinthians 12:4–26**

<sup>4</sup>There are different kinds of spiritual gifts, but the same Spirit gives them. <sup>5</sup>There are different ways of serving, but the same Lord is served. <sup>6</sup>There are different abilities to perform service, but the same God gives ability to all for their particular service. <sup>7</sup>The Spirit’s presence is shown in some way in each person for the good of all.

<sup>8</sup>The Spirit gives one person a message full of wisdom, while to another person the same Spirit gives a message full of knowledge. <sup>9</sup>One and the same Spirit gives faith to one person, while to another person he gives the power to heal. <sup>10</sup>The Spirit gives one person the power to work miracles; to another, the gift of speaking God’s message; and to yet another, the ability to tell the difference

between gifts that come from the Spirit and those that do not. To one person he gives the ability to speak in strange tongues, and to another he gives the ability to explain what is said. <sup>11</sup>But it is one and the same Spirit who does all this; as he wishes, he gives a different gift to each person.

### **One Body with Many Parts**

<sup>12</sup>Christ is like a single body, which has many parts; it is still one body, even though it is made up of different parts. <sup>13</sup>In the same way, all of us, whether Jews or Gentiles, whether slaves or free, have been baptized into the one body by the same Spirit, and we have all been given the one Spirit to drink.

<sup>14</sup>For the body itself is not made up of only one part, but of many parts. <sup>15</sup>If the foot were to say, “Because I am not a hand, I don’t belong to the body,” that would not keep it from being a part of the body. <sup>16</sup>And if the ear were to say, “Because I am not an eye, I don’t belong to the body,” that would not keep it from being a part of the body. <sup>17</sup>If the whole body were just an eye, how could it hear? And if it were only an ear, how could it smell? <sup>18</sup>As it is, however, God put every different part in the body just as he wanted it to be. <sup>19</sup>There would not be a body if it were all only one part! <sup>20</sup>As it is, there are many parts but one body.

<sup>21</sup>So then, the eye cannot say to the hand, “I don’t need you!” Nor can the head say to the feet, “Well, I don’t need you!” <sup>22</sup>On the contrary, we cannot do without the parts of the body that seem to be weaker; <sup>23</sup>and those parts that we think aren’t worth very much are the ones which we treat with greater care; while the parts of the body which don’t look very nice are treated with special modesty,

<sup>24</sup>which the more beautiful parts do not need. God himself has put the body together in such a way as to give greater honor to those parts that need it. <sup>25</sup>And so there is no division in the body, but all its different parts have the same concern for one another. <sup>26</sup>If one part of the body suffers, all the other parts suffer with it; if one part is praised, all the other parts share its happiness.

## **The Message (MSG)**

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### **1 Samuel 3:1–10**

**“Speak, God. I’m Ready to Listen”**

<sup>1–3</sup>The boy Samuel was serving God under Eli’s direction. This was at a time when the revelation of God was rarely heard or seen. One night Eli was sound asleep (his eyesight was very bad – he could hardly see). It was well before dawn; the sanctuary lamp was still burning. Samuel was still in bed in the Temple of God, where the Chest of God rested.

<sup>4–5</sup>Then God called out, “Samuel, Samuel!”

Samuel answered, “Yes? I’m here.” Then he ran to Eli saying, “I heard you call. Here I am.”

Eli said, “I didn’t call you. Go back to bed.” And so he did.



**6-7** God called again, “Samuel, Samuel!”

Samuel got up and went to Eli, “I heard you call. Here I am.”

Again Eli said, “Son, I didn’t call you. Go back to bed.”  
(This all happened before Samuel knew God for himself. It was before the revelation of God had been given to him personally.)

**8-9** God called again, “Samuel!” – the third time! Yet again Samuel got up and went to Eli, “Yes? I heard you call me. Here I am.”

That’s when it dawned on Eli that God was calling the boy. So Eli directed Samuel, “Go back and lie down. If the voice calls again, say, ‘Speak, God. I’m your servant, ready to listen.’” Samuel returned to his bed.

**10** Then God came and stood before him exactly as before, calling out, “Samuel! Samuel!”

Samuel answered, “Speak. I’m your servant, ready to listen.”

## **1 Corinthians 12:4–26**

**4-11** God’s various gifts are handed out everywhere; but they all originate in God’s Spirit. God’s various ministries are carried out everywhere; but they all originate in God’s Spirit. God’s various expressions of power are in action everywhere; but God himself is behind it all. Each person is given something to do that shows who God is: Everyone gets in on it, everyone benefits. All kinds of things are

**handed out by the Spirit, and to all kinds of people! The variety is wonderful:**

**wise counsel**

**clear understanding**

**simple trust**

**healing the sick**

**miraculous acts**

**proclamation**

**distinguishing between spirits**

**tongues**

**interpretation of tongues.**

**All these gifts have a common origin, but are handed out one by one by the one Spirit of God. He decides who gets what, and when.**

**<sup>12-13</sup>You can easily enough see how this kind of thing works by looking no further than your own body. Your body has many parts – limbs, organs, cells – but no matter how many parts you can name, you’re still one body. It’s exactly the same with Christ. By means of his one Spirit, we all said good-bye to our partial and piecemeal lives. We each used to independently call our own shots, but then we entered into a large and integrated life in which *he* has the final say in everything. (This is what we proclaimed in word and action when we were baptized.) Each of us is now a part of his resurrection body, refreshed and sustained at one fountain – his Spirit – where we all come to drink. The old**

labels we once used to identify ourselves – labels like Jew or Greek, slave or free – are no longer useful. We need something larger, more comprehensive.

<sup>14-18</sup>I want you to think about how all this makes you more significant, not less. A body isn't just a single part blown up into something huge. It's all the different-but-similar parts arranged and functioning together. If Foot said, "I'm not elegant like Hand, embellished with rings; I guess I don't belong to this body," would that make it so? If Ear said, "I'm not beautiful like Eye, transparent and expressive; I don't deserve a place on the head," would you want to remove it from the body? If the body was all eye, how could it hear? If all ear, how could it smell? As it is, we see that God has carefully placed each part of the body right where he wanted it.

<sup>19-24</sup>But I also want you to think about how this keeps your significance from getting blown up into self-importance. For no matter how significant you are, it is only because of what you are a *part* of. An enormous eye or a gigantic hand wouldn't be a body, but a monster. What we have is one body with many parts, each its proper size and in its proper place. No part is important on its own. Can you imagine Eye telling Hand, "Get lost; I don't need you"? Or, Head telling Foot, "You're fired; your job has been phased out"? As a matter of fact, in practice it works the other way – the "lower" the part, the more basic, and therefore necessary. You can live without an eye, for instance, but not without a stomach. When it's a part of your own body you are concerned with, it makes *no* difference whether the part is visible or clothed, higher or lower. You give it dignity and honor just as it is, without comparisons. If anything, you have more concern

**for the lower parts than the higher. If you had to choose, wouldn't you prefer good digestion to full-bodied hair?**

**<sup>25-26</sup>The way God designed our bodies is a model for understanding our lives together as a church: every part dependent on every other part, the parts we mention and the parts we don't, the parts we see and the parts we don't. If one part hurts, every other part is involved in the hurt, and in the healing. If one part flourishes, every other part enters into the exuberance.**
