# **Introducing Sight Loss Sunday**

Thank you for your interest in Sight Loss Sunday – an opportunity to become more aware of the growing prevalence of sight loss and to reflect on how our churches can reach out to, include and use the gifts of people with a visual impairment.

This document offers some background information relating to the Sunday, things you can do to observe it, and information about how you can continue to include people with sight loss beyond Sight Loss Sunday.

## **Key Facts**

Sight Loss Sunday takes place on 16 October 2022, and we hope that it will remain an annual event.

The theme for 2022 is: Made in God's Image

The following readings are offered:

• Old Testament: Jeremiah I

Psalm: 139

New Testament (Epistle): Romans 8:31-39

Gospel: John 9

## **Background Information**

#### What is Sight Loss Sunday?

Sight Loss Sunday is an initiative from Torch Trust launched in 2021. It has three main purposes:

- To raise awareness of the prevalence of sight loss in church and local community, and the need for churches to be aware and inclusive of people with sight loss.
- To introduce churches to Torch's Sight Loss Friendly Church initiative to enable them to receive ongoing advice and support.
- To encourage churches to nurture the unique gifts, talents and abilities that people with sight loss can bring to church life.

At Torch, we believe that all people with sight loss have an equal and valuable part to play in churches and Christian communities, and Sight Loss Sunday is designed to equip you to live out these values in your own congregation.

#### Why 16 October?

The second Thursday in October is "World Sight Day".

The week of World Sight Day is also National Braille Week.

15 October is "International White Cane Safety Day"

With so much media attention on sight loss at this time, we thought this was a particularly appropriate day on which to promote a Christian response to sight loss. You could use Sight Loss



Sunday as an opportunity to reflect upon how secular messages about sight loss relate to Christianity, or as a starting point for greater inclusion and involvement of people with sight loss in church life.

#### Who are Torch Trust?

Founded in 1959 and based in Market Harborough, Leicestershire, Torch Trust offers Christian products and services to improve the lives of people with sight loss.

We offer Bibles, hymn books, devotionals, Bible reading notes, magazines, periodicals, theology books, study guides, biographies, autobiographies and Christian fiction in a range of accessible formats including braille, large print and audio. Our publications are available to purchase for no more than the recommended retail price of the print edition, or to borrow free of charge through a postal lending library.

We offer a range of bespoke Christian holidays for people with sight loss in carefully selected locations throughout the UK as part of our "Torch Together" programme, and support "Torch Fellowship Groups", many of which meet on a monthly basis in local churches or online.

Our "Sight Loss Friendly Church" initiative offers training, support and advice to churches of all denominations who wish to be more inclusive of people with sight loss and we produce a variety of audio and video content in-house related to sight loss and Christianity, most notably our "Reflections" radio programme which airs on a Sunday morning on RNIB Connect Radio.

There is no one with sight loss in the congregation – can we still observe Sight Loss Sunday?

Yes – Sight Loss Sunday is for all churches, irrespective of whether or not there are people with sight loss in the congregation.

However, as RNIB estimates that approximately 20% of any given community will experience sight loss in their lifetimes, it is extremely likely that at least one person in your church will have sight loss, although it may only be mild and the person may not have made you aware of it.

We would encourage you to use Sight Loss Sunday as an opportunity to think about how your church would respond if someone with sight loss came to visit or started to attend regularly. See the "Raise Awareness of Sight Loss" section below for some ideas of how to do this.

## Things You Can Do

#### Raise awareness of sight loss

"Sight Loss" is an all-encompassing term used to describe people whose vision is impaired and cannot be corrected through the use of spectacles or contact lenses. In the most extreme cases, this refers to people who are completely blind and require any or all of the following: a long cane, guide dog, braille and audio material. However, it also refers to people who are losing their sight gradually, or who only have a mild visual impairment and can read print which has been enlarged (or, in the case of tunnel vision, made smaller). People do not need to register as "Sight Impaired" or "Severely Sight Impaired/Blind" in order for the term to apply to them and, indeed, as the biggest cause of sight loss is ageing, many people may have sight loss but do not realise it or identify with the term.

Many people with sight loss are able to adapt over time, often with the help of specialist support. Others may require more support from the community.





We have created a video which demonstrates this and offers real world examples of people with sight loss playing their part in the lives of their local churches. We have produced a similar video for Sight Loss Sunday 2022, with people with sight loss talking about their faith, and we would encourage you to make use of this during your Sight Loss Sunday service. We have also produced a reflection from a person with sight loss, and notes to complement this to enable you to prepare a sermon about sight loss in sympathy with the readings.

We are offering some suggested activities for children's groups to introduce them to the idea of sight loss and some of the core adaptations that a person with sight loss might need (e.g. braille and large print).

You are encouraged to use these resources irrespective of whether you believe that a person with sight loss currently worships at your church. It is hoped that this will help you to foster an inclusive attitude towards people with sight loss.

# Involve people with sight loss (if possible)

When talking about people with sight loss, it is always best to draw upon the knowledge and experiences of people in the congregation who experience it for themselves — "Nothing about us without us". At the very least, if someone with sight loss regularly worships at your church, you should talk to them about your plans for Sight Loss Sunday and ask for feedback. Some people with sight loss may have their own ideas which they might like to share with you — please listen to them and consider them with an open mind.

If you know or suspect that a person with sight loss may have a story to share or a gift or talent

which is not usually employed, be proactive; approach them and ask whether they would like a role in a service for Sight Loss Sunday. For example, a person with sight loss could:

- Read aloud a passage from the Bible: if you are using the readings set for Sight Loss Sunday, you can order copies in braille or large print in various Bible translations, thus enabling people with sight loss to read where they might otherwise not be able to do so. - Lead prayers: some suggested prayer points are offered alongside some pre-written prayers to help to facilitate this, and this document is also available in accessible formats from Torch Trust – please call as above.
- Lead music: people with sight loss may have good singing voices and/or may be able to play a musical instrument to a high standard. They could be encouraged to join the church choir or worship band. Alternatively, they could perform a solo song as part of a devotion or in place of one of the regular hymns/songs, or deputise for the choir or worship band for some or all of the service.
- Be interviewed about their experiences of sight loss in your church: you could ask them questions such as how long have you had sight loss, how has your sight loss affected you in daily life, how has sight loss affected your faith, how well does church support you with your sight loss, and what can we do better?
- Preach the sermon: sight loss need not be a barrier to theological understanding, and in some cases may enhance it. If you have had interesting theological conversations with people with sight loss in the past, consider asking them to preach on Sight Loss Sunday. You may find that by doing so you sow the





- seed for the person pursuing further opportunities to exercise a preaching and teaching ministry in the future.
- Give testimony: people with sight loss can sometimes tell very powerful stories relating to how sight loss has strengthened or deepened their faith. Indeed, some people with sight loss come to faith as a direct result of losing their sight. These stories may have a profound impact on the entire congregation and Sight Loss Sunday is a fantastic opportunity for them to be told.
- Lead the entire service: some people with sight loss may already lead services regularly. Others who have lost their sight later in life may have led services regularly when they could see and might appreciate the opportunity to do so on Sight Loss Sunday. Still others may be discerning whether they are being called to a leadership ministry in their church, and leading on Sight Loss Sunday may be a valuable part of this process. If your denomination usually requires a licensed or ordained minister to preside at your particular form of service, consider following an alternative form of service which does not have this requirement. For example, Anglican churches may substitute a Service of the Word or a service of morning prayer for a service of Holy Communion.

## Make your Sight Loss Sunday service accessible

Even if people with sight loss aren't involved in the service directly, they will still want to participate as members of the congregation. There are a few things you can do to make this as smooth an experience as possible:

 Designate one or two volunteers as sighted guides, to show people with sight loss to a

- seat and make them feel comfortable before and after the service.
- If you prepare an order of service and/or notice sheet and the person with sight loss can read large print, enlarge it for them.
  Remember to ask what size of print they need before doing so, and take account of any other special requirements such as choice of font, bold text or coloured paper.
  Alternatively, you could offer to send the order of service and/or notice sheet by email.
- If you project information on screens, offer to produce a paper or email copy as above for people with sight loss.
- If you sing from a hymn book, obtain a large print or braille copy. We have made some hymn/worship song suggestions available for download on our website, and information about obtaining braille and large print books is included at the end of that document.
- If your service involves actions such as sitting, standing or coming forward for communion, ask someone to offer to sit alongside people with sight loss and tell them when these actions are taking place.
- If there is a social time or refreshments after the service, ensure people with sight loss are included and introduced to others.

#### Pray for people with sight loss

As stated above, prayer points and pre-written prayers are available for download. You may freely use these or adapt them to better suit your local circumstances.

We would be grateful if you would remember the work of Torch in your prayers on Sight Loss Sunday. We would also encourage you to refrain from making assumptions when praying for people with sight loss, especially in respect of healing; whilst many people with sight loss yearn for healing, many have come to value their sight loss





as a core part of their identity and do not see healing as necessary or even desirable. It is more appropriate to pray that people with sight loss will be treated equally. # Being Sight Loss Friendly After Sight Loss Sunday

In 2019, Torch launched "Sight Loss Friendly Church", an ongoing initiative offering training, advice and support to churches which either have people with sight loss in their congregations, or who wish to welcome and include people with sight loss in the future. Any church can become a Sight Loss Friendly Church – there are no charges and no minimum standards of support for people with sight loss; we just ask that you make a commitment to improving or upholding accessibility for people with sight loss. We welcome Sight Loss Friendly Churches at all stages, whether you're just starting out or you're including people with sight loss every week.
